PPC April 2012:


- Fragility and immunisation performance not statistically linked

Recommended the country by country approach to the Board




Policy consultation and review process





Two situations require flexibilities in the GAVI model:





The Framework

- Serves as a tool for establishing which countries are to receive a tailored approach
- Contains immunisation and non-immunisation challenges
- Applies to countries that appear in four or more of the categories in the framework
- Identifies ten countries if applied in August 2012



Each country tailored approach will be:

- Flexibilities adjusted to the specific country context:
 - Amount and types of support
 - Processes
 - Type of collaboration
- Developed in collaboration and coordinated with other work streams:
 - Situation analysis
 - Role of partners and GAVI
 - Programme interventions and implementation plan
 - Risks



Time-limited emergency responses

- Dynamic nature of crises no set inclusion criteria
- Extended at the request of the country and/or WHO/UNICEF
- Applicable also to graduating countries (except for additional cash support)
- Vaccine-related recommendations will be in line with forthcoming SAGE guidance on vaccines in emergencies
