**17. Financial clarifications:** Country shall provide the following clarifications to Gavi\*: Not applicable

**18. Other conditions:**

Due to unprecedented demand for IPV and the challenges to scale up production capacities, the global IPV supply remains constrained and is unlikely to meet all country requirements in the short term. As a consequence, the actual presentation and number of doses shipped may differ from those specified in this Decision Letter. In order to mitigate these circumstances, you are strongly encouraged to optimally manage available supply and follow recommendations and guidelines from WHO and UNICEF to reduce vaccine wastage.

If Nigeria envisages a switch in product presentation, it is encouraged to incorporate elements for both IPV presentations in your initial introduction preparations, in order to minimise the need for later interventions and facilitate the switch. In those circumstances, in principle, no product switch grant will be provided to Nigeria.

The country is reminded of its obligations under the PFA in respect of insurance and is requested to provide information to Gavi on the steps it has taken in this regard.
